Happy New Year! As we begin 2020, we will be reading through Proverbs this January, and then Joshua, Judges, & Ruth after that! With 31 chapters in Proverbs and 31 days in January, we will be reading every day. A few thoughts about that: First, keep up with today's reading. If you miss a day, be kind to yourself, read today's chapter. If you can, go back and read the missed chapter. Secondly, I find it interesting to read reflectively with these questions in mind as I read: 1. How have you seen these proverbs play out in the last year?



2. How might these proverbs shape the coming year for growth and fruitfulness? Finally, our Bible Reading Plans are meant to enhance our faith practice and help us grow in our discipleship, not become a burden or drudgery!

On Sunday, January 12, 2020, we will celebrate the Baptism of the Lord Sunday, remembering and reading the story of Jesus' baptism. We will also share "A Covenant Prayer in the Wesleyan Tradition" (No. 607 UMH).

This year, our Sunday school Collective will be during the season of Lent, March 1 - April 5! We will be reading and talking together Reuben Job's book, Three Simple Rules! There happen to be 6

lessons for 6 Sundays! Please consider this in your Sunday school classes that we might all learn together. (There is curriculum available for children, youth, and adults!). We will have more information about pre-ordering books later this month!

Speaking of Lent and lenten disciplines, you should know now that Lent begins on February 26, 2020, Ash Wednesday - AND!!!!! Oyster Supper is Thursday, February 27, 2020. This information may help with choices of lenten disciplines - take up a new avenue of serving with your Church Family at Oyster Supper; give up something besides oysters at the table!

batteries from the tv remote, Brandon was to blame. I had an image of Brandon happily belting out a song with a trail of parts, popcorn and destruction in his wake.

Family is important, and he describes this church as family. It's hard to convey how much it means when people do things for you, are excited to see you, and love you unconditionally. We talked about a church family who is real, who live by what they say, and who's actions we can see. Brandon told me how thankful he is for this church, to see people helping people, and how it feels to be inspired by what you see around you. When you experience love in action, it does something inside your head to motivate you to be better and to pay that kindness forward.

Brandon has experienced his share of trouble, and there is no doubt God had him on a collision course with Renee Kloes and FUMC. Music was always there for him, but without a purpose, it didn't mean much. When you are loved by a family like ours, you can't help but love back and give of yourself because you want to give back, and in doing that, Brandon has found meaning and purpose. We talked about our story and how each individual piece, each person's unique perspective, adds up to the whole story of our church. We may have trouble communicating the complete story with words, but maybe we don't need words. We carry our story with us daily, out into the city, a part of ourselves, and the pieces we have gathered from others. If we are proactive and do what needs to be done, the story will fall into place. We can work together to help others find their way, their purpose, and the love of Jesus. One life touches another in a continuous circle. We don't need to make it hard, as Brandon told me, "Just tell the story for real and be yourself." V





SLEEP IN HEAVENLY PEACE

When SHP began their mission, to make sure no kid sleeps on the floor in SETX, they hoped to build and deliver 100 beds in the first twelve months. As of Christmas Eve. SHP built and delivered 282 beds over the last ten months. KAIROS KITCHEN

Kairos Kitchen is a monthly opportunity to connect with our Downtown Beaumont neighbors, many whom are currently homeless, and serve them a good meal. It's a time of sharing good food, fellowship, prayer, as well as Holy Communion. All are welcome to come and serve. Kairo's Kitchen feeds 60 to 120 people each month on the fourth Saturday from January to October. The next opportunity to serve is January 25.



FIRST FRUITS

We are reaping the fruits of our labor. Our First Fruits Initiative started in August and we have already harvested the indoor garden space twice, helping meet the needs of Kairos Kitchen. Plans for expanding the program are in the works. In addition to providing a healthy bounty, the gardens cultivate discipleship and community. SOME OTHER PLACE

SOP's Soup Kitchen serves on average 300 daily, including Meals on Wheels. In "Chrissie's Building", SOP served 680 families through their annual Thanksgiving Food Store. This December, SOP's Giving Tree helped 650 families, providing approximately 1350 children with at least 2 gifts each. At least 65 of our FUMC families donated their time in December, several spending over 30 hours per week wrapping and bagging gifts!

RAINBOW ROOM

The Rainbow Room is an emergency resource center available to CPS caseworkers to help them meet the critical needs of abused and neglected children. Stocked with all new items, Rainbow Rooms provide clothing, shoes, underwear, baby formula, school supplies and hygiene items to children entering foster or relative care and children in their own homes who live below the poverty line. Ongoing & continued ministry provides a total \$5,000 per month to assist families in emergency situations.
